

## DIVING INTO THE STANDARDS

## Requiring Apologies



#### Relevant Satellite Accreditation Standards

- II. Supporting Children's Development
  - B. The provider supports the development of positive self-esteem by helping children understand and appropriately express their feelings and needs.
    - 6. The provider avoids using statements that discount or belittle children's feelings (for example, "you're not hurt"), or requiring apologies.







#### The Basics

What does sorry mean? Sorry is used as an expression of apology for some form of wrongdoing. When adults want children to apologize, they really want children to feel remorseful and sympathetic. Children are still developing the skills necessary to understand and connect their actions to consequences. A child apologizing after being prompted by an adult does not always mean they understand "the why" behind it. Research shows that although feelings of shame and embarrassment develop as young as 15 months old, children are still developing an understanding of how their actions affect others, physically and emotionally, well into middle childhood.

Why shouldn't you require apologies? Young children must be taught the foundational skills necessary to understand why an action may warrant an apology. This begins with emotional literacy, understanding the feelings of oneself and others. Instead of requiring children to apologize, focus on how their actions affect others. For example: "You were moving too fast and knocked over your friend. Look at their face. They are sad. How can we help them?" When children are resistant to resolve conflicts, they may be experiencing shame, frustration, and anger. Without acknowledging and working through emotions on both sides of a conflict, a resolution can never be fully achieved. There are many ways to show feeling apologetic that go beyond saying sorry.

## **DIVING INTO THE STANDARDS**

## Requiring Apologies (cont.)

How do I teach about consequences? *Pause* (if you can). Take a moment to assess the conflict. See both children the way you wish you would have been seen in these moments as a child. Often young children do not possess the skills to communicate their wants and needs in a way that adults find socially appropriate. This is especially true for infants, toddlers, and all children experiencing big feelings. *Model*. Communicate for them. Teach the skill you are hoping to see. You will have to practice this skill with them consistently overtime. For example, "You were feeling so excited that you forgot to ask Jayden for a turn. Look at his face; he did not like that. What can we do?" *Reinforce*. Once children can prevent or resolve conflicts independently, notice and reinforce the skill. For example, "I saw Oliver share his toy with Monique! Look at how happy she is. That was so kind." With positive guidance from a supportive adult, children will begin to understand how their actions affect those around them.

#### Obtaining Registry Credit\* for Satellite's Virtual (Zoom) Professional Development Sessions

To receive Registry credit at the conclusion of virtual (Zoom) professional development, follow these steps:

- 1. Each participant must register individually even if viewing the training with other participants on the same screen.
- 2. You must be present for the entire session. Late arrivals may not be admitted.
- 3. At the conclusion of the session, you complete an evaluation and then enter your information to receive Registry credit. This must be completed at the end of the session or your professional development hours will not be entered into the Registry by Satellite Family Child Care System. \*\*

You can view and print your proof of attendance through your <u>Wisconsin Registry</u> account. It may take several weeks before your attendance is entered into the Registry. Certificates of completion will not be mailed or emailed to participants.














## **HEALTH & SAFETY**

## **Outdoor Safety**

#### Relevant Satellite Accreditation Standards

- II. Physical Environment, Equipment and Materials
  - A. The environment is organized to support the activities of the program.
    - 14. There is a clean, safe outdoor play area with open space for active, large motor activities and exploration.

#### Outdoor Home Playground Safety Handbook (p 9)

#### **Loose-Fill Materials**

- Maintain a minimum depth of 9 inches of loose-fill materials such as wood mulch/chips, engineered wood
  fiber (EWF), or shredded/recycled rubber mulch for equipment up to 8 feet high; and 9 inches of sand or pea
  gravel for equipment up to 5 feet high.
- Use a minimum of 6 inches of protective surfacing for play equipment less than 4 feet in height.

#### **Placement**

Proper placement and maintenance of protective surfacing is essential. Be sure to:

• Extend surfacing at least 6 feet from the equipment in all directions.

#### Outdoor Area (from the Home Safety Checklist)

- 41. Garden tools and lawn equipment, pesticides and herbicides are stored out of reach of children. Where do you store these items?
- 42. Playground equipment is assembled and anchored according to manufacturer's instructions. Equipment is free from breaks, rust and splinters.
- 43. Cushioning materials (i.e. mats, wood chips, or sand) are used under climbing equipment, slides, and swings-according to Wisconsin State Licensing's recommended guidelines for depth.
- 44. If children have access to your garage, it is properly child proofed.
- 45. The yard is checked and cleared any animal waste daily and before children gain access to the yard.
- 46. Children do not have access to any bodies of water during hours of care, such as in-ground pools, on-ground swimming pools with rigid sides, hot tubs, lakes, or irrigation ditches (*exception: wading pools*). A permanent barrier or other measure prevents children from gaining access to these areas.
- 47. If wading pools are used:
  - a. The water is changed daily. The pool disinfected daily.
  - b. Sight and sound supervision of pools at all times.



## Changes to COVID Reporting Requirements

As of Nov. 1, 2023

Licensed and certified child care programs are no longer required to report COVID-19 cases to public health entities unless there is a hospitalization or pediatric death.

# Paperwork, Paperwork!

Documentation required by every family child care program at the end December each year; email or mail this to your accreditation consultant:



**Home Safety Checklist.** You complete this checklist in your program every 3 months. At the end of the year, a copy of the completed Home Safety Checklist for all four quarters needs to be sent to your accreditation consultant.

This requirement applies to all Satellite providers at the affiliate, associate and accredited levels.

**Continuing education record.** Complete and document a minimum of 20 professional development hours each calendar year. The <u>DCF Staff</u> <u>Continuing Education form</u> is an easy way to organize and provide this documentation.

This requirement applies to all Satellite accredited programs, and for all the lead family child care provider(s) in the program only. This requirement does not apply to part time employees or assistant educators.



## **Tips from the WEESSN Financial Team**

### Wisconsin Shares Policy Update

We are excited to share a change to the current Wisconsin Shares policy that addresses provider payments during weeks of closure. Effective immediately, families may use Wisconsin Shares to pay for up to two weeks of provider closure per year. In addition, providers may also retain payment for state government legal holidays that are not included in the two weeks of closure. These nine holidays include New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr.'s Birthday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and New Year's Eve. Please note payment policies for closures must be consistent for all families in your program. Written payment agreements should be updated to reflect any changes to holidays and/or program closures. The Wisconsin Shares Handbook will be updated to include this policy within the next few months. More information on the new policy can be found here.



## YoungStar Quality Adjustment System Update

The legislature has allocated funding to resume the YoungStar quality adjustment system for 4- and 5-star providers who care for children enrolled in the Wisconsin Shares child care subsidy program. This system will start again in January 2024.

#### Who is eligible for adjustments?

All Accredited Satellite Family Child Care Programs who care for children enrolled in the Wisconsin Shares child care subsidy program are eligible for YoungStar quality adjustment payments.

#### What percentages will the adjustments be?

When they begin in January 2024, adjustment percentages to monthly authorization amounts will be:

- 13% for 4-star providers
- 26% for 5-star providers
